No ticket, permit, or reservation needed to enter Bryce Canyon National Park or ride the park shuttle.

- You **do not** need a permit or reservation to ride a park shuttle.
- You **do not** need a permit or reservation to enter the park.
 - o You **DO** need to pay the <u>park fee</u>. \$35 for private vehicles.
- Bryce Canyon National Park honors the Bryce Canyon Annual Pass, the Interagency Annual Pass, the Annual 4th Grade Pass (Every Kid Outdoors Pass), Senior Annual Pass, Military Annual Pass and the Access and Senior Lifetime Passes.

Save Time and Purchase a Digital Pass

- You can purchase a digital park entrance pass at no additional cost.
- Once purchased, passes for Bryce Canyon National Park must be printed or saved on your mobile device prior to use.
 - Connectivity is limited in the park, therefore printing the permit or saving it on your phone (so you can access it even if there is no wi-fi or cell service) is highly recommended.

Park Shuttle

- In no area of the park is riding the shuttle mandatory
- The shuttle is free with park admission: Your <u>park entrance receipt or annual</u> pass allows you and the occupants of your vehicle unlimited shuttle access.
- Proof of admission must be shown to the bus driver when boarding outside the park. If you have an <u>Interagency Annual, Access, or Lifetime Pass</u>, simply show your pass to the driver when you board.
- The shuttle operates from April through mid-October, and It provides convenient access to trailheads for almost all of the park's many <u>day hikes</u> and is especially suited to scenic one-way hikes along the Bryce Amphitheater Rim Trail.
- The shuttle travels throughout the iconic <u>Bryce Amphitheater</u> area of the park (miles 1-3) from April through mid-October
- **Buses typically arrive at each stop every 15 minutes**, but with the new <u>Bryce Canyon</u> Shuttle Tracker you can time your next ride to the minute.
- The best place to board the shuttle is before you enter the park, at the Shuttle Station in Bryce Canyon City (Stop 1), or at the Visitor Center (Stop 6).
- The best place to park your car is at the Shuttle Station in Bryce Canyon City or the Additional Parking lot across from the Visitor Center.
- All buses are wheelchair accessible and can accommodate 2 bicycles on a front rack.
- Pets are not permitted on the shuttle.

- Stop 1: <u>Bryce Canyon Shuttle Station</u> (recommended parking)
 - o Enjoy free all-day parking, purchase a park pass and board with a shorter line.
- Stop 2: Old Bryce Town
- Stop 3: Best Western+ Grand Hotel
 - o If you're staying here, board here!
- Stop 4: Best Western+ Ruby's Inn
 - o If you're staying here, board here!
- Stop 5: Ruby's Campground (Southbound)
 - o If you're staying here, board here!
- Stop 6: Bryce Canyon Visitor Center (recommended parking, see note below)
 - Talk with a ranger, explore the museum, watch the park film, shop the park bookstore, find restrooms, water, and more. If you're boarding here, be sure to park your car across the street in the Additional Parking Lot. Visitor Center parking is 1 hour.
- Stop 7: Sunset Campground (Southbound)
 - o If you're staying here, board here!
- Stop 8: Bryce Point
 - The first of the park's four most popular views. Enjoy the view and catch another bus to Inspiration Point, or walk 1.5 miles (2.4 km) along the Rim Trail to Inspiration Point (this section of Rim Trail closed in winter). Hikers can also embark on the Peekaboo Loop, Hat Shop Trail, and Under-the-Rim Trail from Bryce Point.
- Stop 9: Inspiration Point
 - The second of the park's four most popular views. Enjoy the view and catch another bus to Sunset Point or walk 0.7 miles (1.1 km) along the Rim Trail to Sunset Point.
- Stop 10: Sunset Campground (Northbound)
- Stop 11: Sunset Point
 - The third of the park's four most popular views. Enjoy the view and catch another bus to Sunrise Point or walk a flat and paved 0.5 miles (0.8 km) to Sunrise Point on the Rim Trail. This section of Rim Trail is the park's most accessible trail. Being paved, it also allows for leashed pets. Hikers can also embark on the Navajo Loop, Queen's Navajo Combination Loop, and other hikes.
- Stop 12: Bryce Canyon Lodge
 - o Enjoy the Lodge Dining Room, lodging, and other amenities.
- Stop 13: Sunrise Point (General Store & High Plateaus Institute are nearby)
 - A 0.2-mile (0.3 km) walk leads from the shuttle stop to Sunrise Point. Enjoy the view and return to shuttle stop to travel to Visitor Center or walk a flat and paved 0.5 miles (0.8 km) to Sunset Point on the Rim Trail. Hikers can also embark on the Queen's Garden Trail, Queen's Navajo Combination Loop, and other hikes.
- Stop 14: Bryce Canyon Visitor Center (Northbound)

• Stop 15: Ruby's Campground (Northbound)

Private vehicle parking

- Bryce Canyon Amphitheater (Miles 1 3)
 - The Bryce Canyon Amphitheater is where you can access the four main viewpoints: <u>Bryce</u>, <u>Inspiration</u>, <u>Sunset</u>, and <u>Sunrise</u> Points. The majority of the park's <u>day hikes</u> can be found in this area.
 - Each of these viewpoints has a parking area that is open to private vehicles, however, due to the popularity of this area, parking spaces can be sparse during our peak seasons.
- Parking Along the Southern Scenic Drive (Miles 4 18)
 - Each viewpoint along the <u>Southern Scenic Drive</u> has parking available. All vehicles, including oversized vehicles over 23 feet (7 meters), are permitted to drive this road and park at all viewpoints.
